■ Release of Open Letter in Response to UN General Assembly's Vote on Resolution to Negotiate a Treaty Banning Nuclear Weapons

[December 24, 2016]

On December 23, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the resolution L.41, to convene negotiations in 2017 on a "legally binding instrument to prohibit nuclear weapons, leading towards their total elimination."

In response to this vote, on December 24, Mayors for Peace issued an open letter, in which we ask all States, including those possessing nuclear weapons and their allies, to participate in the conference and to constructively engage in the negotiations for a nuclear weapons prohibition treaty.

The letter was also sent to all the UN Member States, President of the UN General Assembly, Secretary-General and Secretary-General-designate of the UN, Under-Secretary-General and High Representative for Disarmament Affairs of the UN, and Director-General of UN Office at Geneva.

The negotiations will take place at the UN Headquarters in New York, from March 27 - 31 and June 15 - July 7. Mayors for Peace intends to bring to the negotiation the voices of our member cities and our civil society partners by taking various

opportunities including attending the conference and releasing open letters.

■ Letter to Mr. Obama from the Mayor of Hiroshima

[December 20, 2016]

On December 20, Mr. Yasuyoshi Komizo, Secretary-General of Mayors for Peace, visited the U.S. Embassy to Japan in Tokyo, met with Ambassador Kennedy and handed her a letter from Mayor Matsui of Hiroshima to the U.S. President Barack Obama.

The letter expressed gratitude to Mr. Obama for visiting Hiroshima as the first sitting American president in May 2016 and asked him for his support of the initiatives of Hiroshima City and Mayors for Peace in pursuit of nuclear weapons abolition after the completion of his term.

■ World Forum on Urban Violence and Education for Coexistence and Peace to be Held in Madrid (April 19-21, 2017)

In December 2015, the World Council of United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG) adopted a resolution to hold an international summit against violence and for peace education in Madrid, Spain. After months of preparation, in December 2016, the city of Madrid released an invitation to the First World Forum on Urban Violence and Education for Coexistence and Peace to be held in April 19-21, 2017.

The Forum will be a meeting place for local leaders, international organizations and networks, the academic world, NGOs and civil society. Its purpose is to open a joint process of debate, reflection and construction of common solutions that foster urban environments capable of eliminating expressions of violence.

Mayors for Peace is among the networks that are supporting the event and the City of Granollers, a vice-president and lead city of Mayors for Peace, has joined the organizing committee.

■ Receiving an Intern from Des Moines at the Mayors for Peace Secretariat

[January 11 - 23, 2017]

Following the decision at the 8th General Conference of Mayors for Peace in August 2013, Mayors for Peace has conducted an internship program since 2014, inviting staff from member cities to the Mayors for Peace Secretariat in Hiroshima City and having them engage in peace- and Secretariat-related work.

Ms. Pa Vang Goldbeck, from Des Moines, Iowa, U.S., a Lead City of Mayors for Peace, will be working as an intern at the Mayors for Peace Secretariat from January 11 until January 23. By the end of March 2017, the Secretariat will have hosted two more interns from Muntinlupa (Philippines), and Malakoff (France).

***A second-generation of an A-bombed Ginkgo tree is growing in a school in Sant Feliu de Llobregat**

On the occasion of the International Day of Educating Cities, on November 30th, the city of Sant Feliu de Llobregat, member city of Mayors for Peace and also member of the executive committee of the Catalan Chapter of Mayors for Peace, organized an event titled “planting the tree of hope” in a local school “Aula Sant Feliu.” The participants joined an origami workshop and observed a planting ceremony in which a second generation A-bombed Ginkgo biloba from Hiroshima was planted in the school’s courtyard.

The ginkgo was one of the trees that had been grown in “Viver de Bell-lloc,” a nursery garden near Granollers, based on the protocol of agreement signed between Mayor Josep Mayoral as Vice-president of Mayors for Peace and Viver de Bell-lloc. It is a joint program of Mayors for Peace and the city of Granollers to utilize the trees as a symbol of peace in the hope of conveying the realities of the atomic bombings and raising public awareness for peace.

Several more seedlings of Ginkgo biloba, Diospyros kaki and Cinnamomum camphora are currently growing in the nursery garden under the care of a group of staff as part of a social program. Once these seedlings of A-bombed trees are ready, they will be delivered to other member cities to be planted in public parks or gardens.

■ “Peace News from Hiroshima” (Contributed by the Hiroshima Peace Media Center)

There are surely feelings of both anticipation and anxiety as we embark on the year 2017. Although making projections for the future is not an easy task, it is certain that this year will bring major changes along with the new leaders of countries and international organizations.

Antonio Guterres assumed the post of U.N. Secretary General on January 1. Donald Trump will replace Barack Obama as President of the United States on January 20. France will pick a new president to replace Francois Hollande in an election to be held on May 7, and the election for the French National Assembly will be held in June. In Germany, the leader of Europe, elections for the federal parliament will be held in autumn.

With populism rising in many nations, extreme ideas have grown more popular, including the expulsion of immigrants and refugees. The kind of changes we see this year are crucial. We are concerned that intolerance and divisions will beset our societies.

One hopeful change anticipated by the people of Hiroshima involves the multilateral negotiations to pursue a treaty to ban nuclear weapons, which will begin in March. However, these negotiations are expected to face difficulty since the nuclear

powers, including the United States and Russia, are opposed to such a treaty. Still, the citizens of Hiroshima will do what we can to help the world take the first step toward becoming free of nuclear weapons.

■ Mayors for Peace Membership Fee

At the 8th General Conference of Mayors for Peace in August 2013, the introduction of an annual Membership Fee was determined in order to strengthen the foundation of Mayors for Peace and the sense of solidarity amongst member cities. Following this decision, Mayors for Peace has instituted an annual membership fee of 2,000 Japanese Yen (about USD19/ EUR17) per city. We would like to thank everyone for their 2016 membership fee contributions. The funds raised by this fee will be utilized as a resource for the projects listed on the Mayors for Peace Action Plan (2013-2017).

■ Plea to Support Our Nuclear Weapons Convention Petition Drive

The next step in abolishing all nuclear weapons by 2020 is to negotiate a nuclear weapons convention. A nuclear weapons convention will prohibit the development, production, testing, stockpiling and use of nuclear weapons and all related activities. Mayors for Peace is promoting a global grassroots petition drive as a way in which all member cities can call for an immediate start to negotiations of a nuclear weapons convention. Promotion of this petition drive is included in the Mayors for Peace Action Plan (2013-2017) that was adopted at the 8th General Conference in August 2013.

Thanks to many supporters across the world, we have received 2,460,920 signatures as of January 1, 2017.

Let us gather millions more and make our voices heard.
