Course Objectives

- 1. To enhance the students' consciousness about the current social situation related to the nuclear weapons.
- 2. To learn the issues about nuclear weapon and its destruction. In addition, the students will be familiar with the historical facts and dates about the dropping of the nuclear weapons. By covering these historical backgrounds, the students will understand the purpose of peace studies.
- 3. To observe the dropping the atomic bombs in Hiroshima and Nagasaki from both U.S. and Japanese perspectives. The class also will discuss about Hibakusha's life after the atomic bombings.

- 14. Does the Nonproliferation policy work?
- 15. New Nuclear Strategies and the future tasks for nuclear abolition movements

The class will also show several videos. In every class the students will be responsible to write a reaction paper, and at the next class some of them will be introduced to the class.
