

In 1910, women's activist Clara Zetkin proposed the idea of an International Women's Day (IWD) to celebrate the achievements of women and raise awareness of women's issues. Her idea was taken up by a range of women's groups, including trade unions, socialist societies and working women's clubs, resulting in the first International Women's Day in 1911.

The Women's Day movement has gone from strength to strength, spreading globally. Manchester has celebrated International Women's Day for over 25 years and each year the International Women's Day Steering Group, chaired by Councillor Suzanne Richards and made up of organisations, individuals and partners (who support financially) from across the city, set a theme for Manchester's celebrations.

This year's theme is **Women as Peacemakers.**



From international conflict to local community cohesion, women are the peacemakers. Coinciding with the 100th anniversary of the start of the First World War, International Women's Day 2014 is the perfect opportunity to celebrate the role women have played and continue to play in conflict resolution and peacebuilding.

As community leaders, politicians, mothers, doctors, police officers, teachers, lawyers and myriad other roles that women hold in Manchester, women have led by example. 2014 is our chance to shine a light on the work of these women, who create safe and stable communities in Manchester and beyond.

This diary includes events funded through Manchester City Council's fund for local not-for-profit organisations. Part of the criteria for this year's grants was to create events linked to the Peacemaker theme. The events listed in this booklet also include events from partners and other organisations.

As part of the IWD celebrations, Manchester City Council will be hosting the second Manchester International Women's Day Awards on Friday 7 March 2014 at Manchester Town Hall, to recognise unsung women who make an important contribution to the city.

Statue Exhibition

In 2013, high-profile feminist campaigns like 'No More Page Three' and 'Women on Banknotes' inspired us to think about how women are represented in society. We were shocked to learn that of 640 listed statues in the UK, only 15% are of women, and most of those are statues of monarchs or mythological characters.

We noticed that barring Queen Victoria's status through accident of birth, Manchester's municipal statues still only celebrate the achievement of historical men.

We've chosen eight women from Greater Manchester with diverse backgrounds and achievements, all of whom deserve recognition:

Sunny Lowry - the channel swimmer who scoffed 40 eggs a week; Sylvia Pankhurst - the suffragette who became an honorary Ethiopian; Esther Roper - the protector of barmaids' jobs; Dr Kathleen Drew-Baker - the saviour of Japan's sushi seaweed industry; Elizabeth Gaskell - the novelist whose books were burnt by mill owners; Louise Da-Cocodia - the race relations and community enterprise champ; Kathleen Ollerenshaw - the maths boffin and politician; and Annie Horniman - the flamboyant arts patron.

We've timed our exhibition so our celebration of Esther Roper can put some 'L' into February's LGBT history month. On 8 March, International Women's Day, we'll be speaking about our project at the People's History Museum's Suffragette Legacy Conference.

Come and check our crocheted masks on the ground floor of Manchester Town Hall, and learn about some amazing local women.

One Day After Peace - film screening and Q and A session

This is Manchester's first-ever screening of the multi-award-winning documentary One Day After Peace, and it will be followed by a discussion with the film's lead. Robi Damelin.

After her son is killed by a Palestinian sniper at a checkpoint in the West Bank, Israeli peace activist Robi is faced with a deep personal challenge: how to continue to choose the path of understanding, and even forgiveness, rather than giving in to the cycle of revenge and violence.

Searching for answers, she travels to South Africa to explore how people and communities came together in a post-apartheid world, to see if there are lessons that could apply, not just to her own life, but to Israel and Palestine more broadly.

Packed with personal stories told against the backdrop of the world's biggest challenges, Robi's thought-provoking journey is educational and inspiring. Trying at times, it leads from a place of deep personal pain to a belief that a better future is possible.

The Shakti Face is the face of spiritual wisdom and power - the key to return to our true self without the struggle and cost of the Modern Face.


