■Letter of Protest Against Nuclear Test Conducted by DPRK

[September 9, 2016]

It was announced that the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) conducted a nuclear test on September 9.

■2016 Mayors for Peace Youth Exchange for Peace: Support Program for "HIROSHIMA & PEACE" [August 2 - 10, 2016]

Mayors for Peace launched its Youth Exchange for Peace Support Program this year, which is aimed at supporting participation by young people from its member cities in ongoing programs of Hiroshima City to share A-bomb survivors' experiences and their message of peace and to promote youth exchanges.

As part of this support program, 8 young representatives from 6 member cities around the world attended the Hiroshima City University's intensive summer course "HIROSHIMA and PEACE," in which students from around the world study and discuss Hiroshima and peace in English from August 2 to August 10. In addition to the university's course, they joined in the Mayors for Peace's own program, in which they exchanged views on their future peace activities.

■Events to Commemorate the International Day Against Nuclear Tests of August 29

The United Nation has established August 29 as a fixed International Day Against Nuclear Tests to call for increasing awareness and education about the effects of nuclear weapon test explosions or any other nuclear explosions and the need for their cessation as one of the means of achieving the goal of a nuclear-weapon-free world. On this day various events are organized across the world.

On August 28 and 29, the Senate of the Republic of Kazakhstan, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Kazakhstan and Parliamentarians for Nuclear Proliferation and Disarmament (PNND) co-sponsored an international conference "Building a Nuclear-Weapon-Free World" in Astana, the capital of Kazakhstan, in commemoration of the International Day Against Nuclear Tests and also the 25th anniversary of the closing of the Soviet nuclear test site in Kazakhstan.

Nearly 200 parliamentarians, mayors, religious leaders, government representatives, disarmament experts and representatives from international organizations from around the world joined this forum. Honorary Mayor Thore Vestby of Frogn, Norway, represented Mayors for Peace and delivered a message on behalf of President of Mayors for Peace.

On August 31, there was an informal meeting of the United Nations General Assembly to mark this year's International Day Against Nuclear Tests at the UN Headquarters in New York. Following the official Opening Ceremony was a High-Level Interactive Panel on "Strengthening the Global Norm Against Nuclear Tests – CTBT@20." Along with the President of the General Assembly and the UN's Under-Secretary General for Disarmament, Randy Rydell, Executive Advisor of Mayors for Peace, also joined this meeting as a panel member to address prospects for entry into force of the CTBT and to voice Mayors for Peace views to a UN community audience.

■ "Peace News from Hiroshima" (Contributed by the Hiroshima Peace Media Center)

It is now a crucial time for the international community to advance toward abolishing nuclear weapons, a goal long called for by the cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Last month, the United Nations working group on nuclear disarmament adopted a report which recommends to the U.N. General Assembly that negotiations for a legal ban on nuclear weapons begin in 2017. Full discussions on this matter will be held at the U.N. General Assembly in September.

Some say this is a large step forward, since there has been a long-standing impasse in the progress of nuclear disarmament. Others see a widening rift between the countries calling for nuclear abolition and the nations with nuclear arms and those protected under a nuclear umbrella. The United States and other nuclear powers have not even joined the working group. Australia and others that are protected under a nuclear umbrella opposed the adoption of the report. It will not be easy to bridge the gulf between the two sides, even within the U.N. General Assembly.

Japan abstained from voting, but needless to say, it will play a central role in the future developments involving this issue. As the only nation to have experienced atomic attack, Japan should play its part fully, serving as a bridge between the nuclear and non-nuclear nations so that the international community will work in earnest toward achieving a favorable balance between nuclear abolition and the national security of every nation. Hiroshima must continue conveying to the world its message that nuclear weapons are inhumane and that a nuclear war could lead to the extinction of the human species. Such efforts will reflect the wishes of the A-bomb victims and the survivors, who have had to live with the grief of losing loved ones to the bombings while facing continuous fears over the aftereffects of radiation.

UK groups and the local Mayors for Peace chapter welcome the Peace Boat to special events in London

A special symposium and reception welcoming the Japanese Peace Boat group will take place in London on October 3rd. It will directly follow on from the business meeting of the UK and Ireland Mayors, Provosts and Leaders for Peace Chapter.

The high quality speaker programme for the symposium will include a first and second generation Hiroshima and Nagasaki survivor of the atomic weapon attacks in August 1945. Other speakers include the Shadow Defence Secretary Emily Thornberry (invited), the investigative journalist Rob Edwards - who will profile his recent report on the safely of UK nuclear weapon convoys by road, the ICAN Vice Chairs Akira Kawasaki from Peace Boat and Rebecca Johnson from the Acronym Institute, and Sean Morris of NFLA / Mayors for Peace. The meeting will be co-chaired by Cllr Grace Fletcher-Hackwood from Manchester City Council and London Assembly Member Caroline Russell.

■ Request for Payment of the 2016 Mayors for Peace Membership Fee
