# ■Invitation for Applicants to the 2018 Youth Exchange for Peace: Support Program for "HIROSHIMA and PEACE" Course

"HIROSHIMA and PEACE" is an intensive summer course hosted by the Hiroshima City University, in which students from around the world study and discuss Hiroshima and peace in English. This year again, Mayors for Peace will conduct a program to provide financial and other support to selected youth from member cities participating in the course and is now accepting applications for participation in this program from member cities.

We request each member city to widely advertise this program in their city, gather up interested local applicants, and email the required documents by Friday April 13, 2018 at 3pm in Japan Standard Time (UTC +9).

Hiroshima City University and the Mayors for Peace Secretariat will select the participants and notify member cities of the results in the middle of May 2018.

The International Youth Conference for Peace in the Future is an annual youth conference established in 2005, which aims to bring together youth (high school students and college students) from sister and friendship cities of Hiroshima and have them think about peace, deepen the friendship and mutual understanding between our cities, and raise awareness about world peace among the next generation. This conference is hosted alternately by the City of Hiroshima and its sister and friendship cities.

In 2017, Mayors for Peace began providing financial and other support to selected youth participants from member cities when the conference is hosted by the City of Hiroshima. As Hiroshima will not host this year's conference, so Mayors for Peace will not offer this support program this year.

## ■ Receiving an Intern from Tehran at the Mayors for Peace Secretariat [January 9-26, 2018]

Mayors for Peace has conducted an internship program since 2014, inviting staff from member cities to the Mayors for Peace Secretariat in Hiroshima City and having them engage in peace- and Secretariat-related work. This program was established with the aim of improving the international functions of the Secretariat. It is hoped that the experience of learning about the realities of the atomic bombing in Hiroshima and sharing in the city's wish for peace will help interns identify more personally with the organization, inspiring them to contribute to its development and to peace activities in their home countries, and ultimately strengthening the network among member cities.

Ms. Fateme Babaha, from Tehran, Iran, the Lead City of Mayors for Peace, worked as an intern at the Mayors for Peace Secretariat from January 9 to 26. The Secretariat will have hosted an intern from Granollers (Spain) by the end of March 2018.

#### \*Mayor of Granollers meets with UCLG President Parks Tau in Barcelona

On January 25, Mayor Mayoral of Granollers, a Vice President and Lead City of the Catalan Chapter, met with President of United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG) Parks Tau durig the fourth edition of Annual Retreat & Campus held in Barcelona from January 22 to 26, 2018. Mayor Mayoral also serves as a member of UCLG World Council and he expressed his intention to find new avenues of cooperation and build a strategic alliance of work between UCLG and Mayors for Peace.

UCLG is an umbrella organisation for cities, local and regional governments, and municipal associations throughout the world and understands itself as the united voice and world advocate of democratic local self-government.

Mayoral, who has been commissioned to create collaboration with UCLG during the 9th General Conference of Mayors for Peace in Nagasaki last year, shared with President Tau its willingness to promote programmes of action on a Culture of Peace at local level and the commitment of Mayors for Peace to work closely with UCLG in this field.

#### \* Donation of a seedling of an A-bombed Ginkgo tree

The City of Hannover, a Vice President and Lead City of the German Chapter, has grown second-generation seedlings of an A-bombed Ginkgo tree since the city received seeds from its sister city Hiroshima in 2014.

On the occasion of the 30th anniversary of the youth exchange program between Hiroshima YMCA and Hannover YMCA, the City of Hannover donated one of the seedlings to Hannover YMCA. On January 22, the donation ceremony took place at Hannover City Hall with the presence of Mayor Schostok of Hannover, the delegation of Hiroshima YMCA, and representatives from Hannover YMCA. The donated seedling will be planted in spring at Camp Abbensen, which is located in a suburb of Hannover. It is hoped that the A-bombed Ginkgo tree will convey the message of Hiroshima to the many youth visiting the campsite.

### **Peace News from Hiroshima**" (Provided by the Hiroshima Peace Media Center)

The United States has released its latest Nuclear Posture Review (NPR), the guidelines for that nation's nuclear policy. Even though it was expected that U.S. nuclear policy would undergo a large overhaul under the administration of President Donald Trump, the NPR has come as a significant shock.

There are two critical concerns.

One is the statement that the United States would have the option of responding with nuclear weapons to a non-nuclear attack, including an attack using conventional weapons.

The other is the aim of developing and introducing "usable" nuclear weapons of a smaller size.

These ideas move beyond the boundary of nuclear "deterrence" and sound as if the assumption is being made that nuclear weapons will be used in actual warfare. It is inconceivable that the Japanese government has welcomed the NPR in this form.

Hearing this news, we cannot help but think of the Doomsday Clock. In January, the Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists, a U.S. science magazine, advanced the clock to "two minutes to midnight." It is terrifying to think that the Doomsday Clock is now in the same position as it was in 1953, when the United States and the Soviet Union were conducting hydrogen bomb tests during the Cold War. The clock surely reflects not only the growing tensions involving North Korea but also apprehension with regard to President Trump's nuclear policy.

With the establishment of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons, we saw a sign of hope for the elimination of nuclear weapons. The people of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, as well as those who hold a strong desire for peace, must act with a greater sense of urgency and speak out more strongly. Regardless of the scale of their explosion, the use of nuclear weapons can only cause devastating consequences. And relying on nuclear weapons for national security is exceedingly dangerous. These are truths that must be conveyed to people all over the world. In addition, we must press the Japanese government to end its reflexive support for U.S. nuclear policy. And we must urge Mr. Trump to visit Hiroshima and Nagasaki and understand the reality of the atomic bombings of these cities.
