
Selection results: Mayors for Peace Children's Art Competition "Peaceful Towns" 2025 Mayors for Peace Secretary General Award

Ari Keith-Dobson in Fremantle, Australia (9 years old)



The painting is divided into two worlds by a single line. The upper half is dark, with smoke from explosions rising, buildings collapsing, and starlike fragments scattered about. This part represents the devastation and tragedy of war. The lower half is bright, with blue skies and green mountains stretching out, a white dove flying with an olive branch in its beak, and the Great Wall of China also depicted. This part illustrates a peaceful and beautiful scene of daily life. Such contrast shows how deeply we cherish and desire peace. The terror and destruction of war leave deep wounds in people, and we never want to return to that burned-out wasteland of the past. This is why the peace symbolized by the white dove is the most precious thing we must protect. We must always keep the ""longing for peace"" embodied in this painting in our hearts, distance ourselves from conflict, and walk the path of tolerance and understanding.
